- Z-1 APPLICATION A04-11-003 GRANDE BOULEVARD (ABSTRACT A0616 V LOUPEY TRACTS 32A, 32, 33, 34; ABSTRACT A0690 L MCGUIRE TRACTS 8E, 8, 29; 3485 AND 3513 EAST GRANDE BOULEVARD; 13650, 13660, 13661, 13670, 13671, 13680, 13681, 13690, 13691 SYDNEY ROAD; 9800, 9810, 9820, 9821, 9830, 9831, 9840, 9841, 9850, 9851, 9861 STAR ROAD; AND 13970 STATE HIGHWAY 110 SOUTH).
 - Request that the City Council consider adopting an ordinance providing for the annexation of 30 properties along and including East Grande Boulevard, Sydney Road, and Star Road. The proposed annexation area consists of territory lying adjacent to and contiguous to the present boundary limits of the City of Tyler, approximately 98.664 acres of land located along the Grande Boulevard extension on the west side of State Highway 110, and consider establishing:
 - A. The new boundary of the City Limits;
 - B. The new boundary of the Extraterritorial Jurisdiction.
 - C. The new boundary of the City Council Map to East District No. 5;
 - D. The Land Use Guide to reflect Mutlifamily, General Commercial, and Agricultural Land Use.
 - E. Original zoning of 98.664 acres containing 19.179 acres of "R-MF", Multi-Family Residential District, 48.442 acres of "AG", Agricultural District, and 31.043 acres of "C-2", General Commercial District. (O-2011-32)

<u>Dallas Cothrum, 900 Jackson St. #640, Dallas Texas</u> – Stated that he was here representing Oncor Electric Delivery and that what they had requested on the part of the transmission line will allow or spur future development in the area.

PRESENTATIONS

P-1 Request that the City Council consider hearing a presentation about the formation of a Mayor's Veterans' Roundtable.

<u>Susan Guthrie</u>, <u>Director of External Relations & Organizational Development</u> — Stated that Tyler has a long history of strong support for our nation's veterans. To continue to grow this tradition and to serve as a model to other communities, Mayor Barbara Bass has appointed a Mayor's Veterans' Roundtable with Mayor Pro Tem Ralph Caraway to serve as the Council liaison.

The intent of the Roundtable is to develop and implement a Community Blueprint for supporting and enhancing veterans' services in our community as well as positively impacting the local economy. The focus of the Roundtable will be on employment, education, housing, medical care and mental health.

<u>John Furlow Cr 344</u> — Stated that there are 18,000 veterans in Smith County and growing. This shows a lot of vision on the Mayor and City Council's part on getting ahead of the game by establishing this committee, which will be comprised of veterans and committee leaders to address the three areas of education, housing, and medical health.

P-2 Request that the City Council consider hearing a presentation from City University about the newly launched Called to S-E-R-V-E Spirit Customer Service Training.

Kristi Boyett, Training Coordinator- According to the City of Tyler Blueprint, the City's first core value states "The highest premium is placed on responsiveness to citizens' needs." While the Blueprint has been the long-term culture and conceptual framework for the City of Tyler, the motto of City employees, "Called To S-E-R-V-E," really brings home the vision of serving a higher purpose and being here to effectively serve the Tyler community.

As part of a Lean Sigma project, the City University began rolling out customer service training in February of this year. The training was designed to give all 800 City employees the tools necessary to exceed the expectations of our customers, Tyler residents, in a timely, efficient and courteous manner. The training is an interactive curriculum with five modules covering a variety of adult learning activities. The five modules are Called to SERVE, Share Your Expertise, Be A Pro, Follow Through and The Personal Touch.

This initiative was created by and for City employees in an effort to continue the City of Tyler's reputation as the model for good government in the region and state, by showcasing the incredible hearts and passion for service that City of Tyler employees demonstrate each day.

ORDINANCE

O-1 Request that the City Council consider adopting an Ordinance amending Tyler City Code Chapter 15., "Franchise", Article I. "In General", Section 15-4., "Rate determination" to update the requirements for regulated entities petitioning for rate change. (O-2011-33)

<u>Gary Landers, City Attorney</u> – Stated that the Tyler City Code Chapter 15 contains provisions relating to various kinds of franchises. The general franchise requirements for rate determination are located in City Code Chapter 15, Article I., and contain requirements for petitioning the City Council for a change of rates by the regulated entity. These provisions currently require that the regulated entity submit all necessary information to allow the City Council to make a reasonable determination of rate base, expenses, investment and rate of return within the City limits.

A review of the provisions related to the requirements for a rate change petition by a regulated entity operating within the City limits indicates that additional requirements should be considered in order to enhance the City Council's ability to fully review and make reasonable determinations of rate base, expenses, investment and rate of return within the City limits Motion by Councilmember Mezayek; seconded by Councilmember Whatley; motion carried 6 - 0 & approved as presented.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

H-1 Request that the City Council consider conducting a public hearing to obtain Citizen comment and consider adopting an Ordinance to amend the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program 2006, 2007, and 2008 Annual Plans and approve the reprogramming of funds. (O-2011-34)

Brenda Johnson, Director of Neighborhood Services – Stated that in accordance with the policies, plans and regulations for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, the City must amend its previously approved CDBG Program budgets so that activities and projects are carried out and completed in a timely manner. Amendments are needed on the 2006, 2007, and 2008 Annual Plans in order to maintain program compliance and meet HUD regulatory requirements.

Funds were allocated in the 2006, 2007, and 2008 Annual Plans for housing rehabilitation, down payment and closing costs assistance, and public facilities improvements in designated target areas for low income homeowners and residents. Due to low participation of the homeowners and residents, and completion of the public facilities project, all funds were not expensed. City staff has determined that there is a need for public facility improvements in non-designated target areas within the City of Tyler which will benefit low/moderate income residents. Specifically, a total of \$286,000 is intended to be used as an infrastructure investment incentive for a new affordable housing development in Forest Meadows.

MISCELLANEOUS



Request that the City Council consider authorizing the City Manager to execute an economic development incentive agreement with North Chase Development, LLC for the development of the Forest Meadows Subdivision located on North Broadway in support of the Neighborhood Empowerment Zone (NEZ). ©

Brenda Johnson, Director of Neighborhood Services - On March 23, 2011 the City Council adopted an ordinance amending Tyler City Code Chapter 7 to codify established guidelines for creating a Neighborhood Empowerment Zone, and created a Neighborhood Empowerment Zone for the Forest Meadows Subdivision and adopted the proposed boundaries, guidelines, and incentives of the NEZ pilot program.

The adopted NEZ will encompass a new neighborhood in North Tyler. The tract is approximately 7.91 acres and located North of the Lake View Apartment Development under construction on North Broadway Avenue. The developer is Ed Thompson, President of North Chase Development, LLC. As an identified Tyler 21 initiative to create 3000 rooftops in the north Tyler area, the NEZ program will focus on the development of an entire neighborhood comprised of at least 20 homes on contiguous lots. It is anticipated that with the increase of affordable housing stock economic development will follow.

The Developer will build twenty (20) units to be sold for use as owner-occupied housing, and of those 20 units seven (7) will meet affordable housing criteria, in exchange, the City will provide the funds in an amount up to but not to exceed \$286,000 under the CDBG Public Facilities program to construct street and utilities for Phase I of the construction project. In addition, the City will provide the following incentives to the Developer for the Forest Meadows Development:

- 1. Waive or rebate zoning fees
- 2. Waive or rebate platting fees
- 3. Waive building permit fees
- 4. Waive testing fees
- Waive tap fees

- 6. Provide direct access to Neighborhood Services First Time Homebuyers program (first come/first serve basis-pending approved application)
- 7. Provide an infrastructure incentive in the amount of \$2000 per unit (single-family attached) or \$1000 per unit (R-1D- single family detached) up to the maximum of 50 units. This is to be paid at the time the certificate of occupancy is issued for each unit, or when permanent utility service is activated
- 8. Waive Escrow for North Broadway Extension.

The City will issue a notice to proceed to the Developer after the completion of the City's portion of the infrastructure. The Developer will complete construction of seven (7) owner occupied, affordable single-family housing units (per HUD's definition) within three (3) years of the date of the City's Notice to Proceed.

M-2 Request that the City Council consider authorizing the City Manager to accept grant funding through the Family Self Sufficiency Program (FSS) for one (1) FSS Coordinator position to enhance the housing efforts of the department. (O-2011-35)

Gary Swindle, Police Chief – Stated that Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) is a HUD program that encourages communities to develop local strategies to help voucher families obtain employment that will lead to economic independence and self-sufficiency. Public housing agencies (PHAs) work with welfare agencies, schools, businesses, and other local partners to develop a comprehensive program that gives participating FSS family members the skills and experience to enable them to obtain employment that pays a living wage. FSS program services may include, but are not limited to: child care, transportation, education, job training and employment counseling, substance/alcohol abuse treatment or counseling, household skill training, and homeownership counseling.

Families who receive assistance under the HCV are eligible to participate in the FSS program. For the most part, PHAs must rely on their own or other local resources to operate FSS programs. However, under the authority of annual appropriations acts, HUD has been able to provide some funding for FSS program coordinators to assist PHAs in operating housing choice voucher FSS programs. Other than annual funding for HCV FSS program coordinators salaries, no specific funding is provided by HUD. FSS program coordinators assure that FSS program participants are linked to the supportive services they need to achieve economic self-sufficiency.
