Tyler's zoo began simply enough in the late 1930's in the Caldwell backyard, a charming preschool petting zoo with leftover Easter bunnies, a squirrel or two, some ducks, and a few exotic birds, and an alligator at one time. As the story goes in the early 50s, Lottie called her husband home and told him there were 40-50 people in their backyard enjoying the animals. Today, this Tyler landmark, owned and operated by the Caldwell Foundation attracts nearly 300,000 people a year from a 200 mile radius to see 200 species of 1900 animals.

All this began with a simple man coming to Tyler, Texas, hired to supervise the construction of the first hard surface roads in Smith County – he was 32 years old. D.K. was from Scottsboro, Alabama, and a graduate of Alabama Polytechnic – now, Auburn. Because of prior experience with road building, he knew what would work in East Texas and what would wash away with the first heavy rain. The first concrete road in Smith County was a 3 ½ mile stretch on Tyler-Dallas Hwy (64) opened in 1921. While working for Smith County, he urged and was influential in the formation of the State Highway Commission and the Texas Highway Department. In the late 20s, when his eyesight began to fail, he detoured to his second and third careers – real estate, rental properties and equities. When the Van oil field came in 1928, he was able to buy royalty interest....he was not a risk taker, but bought a share in the Lake Devernia development near Gladewater and behold, the East Texas Oil Field was discovered to extend beneath the entire property. As if the oil company was not enough, D.K. was a founder and vicepresident of Tyler Iron and Foundry (1936); served on the board of Elizabeth Bell Corp. Although D. K. Caldwell never had children, he was a champion for children by serving on the Tyler Camp Fire Girls Board (one of his favorites). He was the principal force in the formation of the Smith County/Tyler Youth Foundation which established Camp Tyler, and established the Caldwell Playschools which existed for 41 years. He was also responsible for building the first residential home for the elderly in Tyler – Sunset Home. Given his love for community involvement, he took an active role in local government and was on the City Council, City Planning Commission and Civil Service Board. D.K. Caldwell made a last ditch effort to buy the Smith County Courthouse (because of his love of landmarks), and save it from demolition, but his offer was rejected. It was D.K. Caldwell that bought the John Tyler Auditorium when the school was abandoned in the 60s, and turned it into a respectable place for the East Texas Symphony and Rose Festival Coronation for years to come.

His honors included: Engineer of the Year (1952), T.B. Butler Award for outstanding community service (1969); honored by Camp Fire Girls and AAUW and East Texas Chamber of Commerce in 1968. May 20, 1968, was declared D.K. Caldwell Day in Tyler. His obituary includes the following honors: 12 years on City Planning Commission, past president of Tyler Rotary Club, A Paul Harris Fellow of the Rotary Foundation, Director of People's National Bank and in 1973, was named Outstanding Citizen of Scottsboro – his birthplace.

D.K. Caldwell was a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, director of Workreation, Inc., director of Goodwill Industries of Tyler, board member and past president of the Camp Fire Girls, Inc., member of Friends of Carnegie Library and a member of the Smith County Historical Society.

I truly believe D.K. Caldwell has left his mark on Tyler during his lifetime and this contribution continues today. Many young people were touched by his generosity and his "hands on" approach. I know that I was, personally.
