Willie Neal Johnson

Willie Neal Johnson (1935–2001) was a gospel singer who became known as "Country Boy" for his rootsy blues-driven style and his down to earth friendly personality. Willie was born in Tyler, Texas on August 25, 1935 he was the oldest of six children in a musical family. After his father died when he was 14 so he quit school to go to work to support his mother & younger siblings. His mother motivated her children to pursue their singing careers by taking them to church and making them sing on Sundays. One of the outstanding gospel performers of all times, Willie started singing at an early age, while in his teens he was tapped to join Rev. C. W. Jackson's group the Five Ways of Joy Gospel Singers. A few years later he formed Willie Neal Johnson and the Gospel Keynotes with long-time friends, Ralph McGee, Rev. J. D. Talley, Charles Bailey, John Jackson, Lonzo Jackson, and Archie B. McGee. After rising to popularity across the Southwest, the group signed to Nashboro Records where they scored a major hit with Show Me the Way. They received a Grammy nomination in 1980 for Aint No Stoppin' Us Now. The Gospel Keynotes went on to record over 20 LPs for Nashboro.

In 1985 after Nashboro closed its doors, they signed to the Malaco Music label located in Jackson, MS. where they changed their name to Willie Neal Johnson and the New Keynotes. With Malaco they recorded seven albums. They were inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in Detroit and the American Gospel Quartet Hall of Fame in Birmingham, Alabama in 1999. The group, particularly known for "That's My Son," received gospel's coveted Stellar Awards for "Lord Take Us Through" and "The Country Boy Goes Home" and was nominated for "The Country Boy Goes Home II.

Mr. Johnson's last recording was an appearance on Kirk Franklin's The Rebirth of Kirk Franklin in 2000 on the song Lookin' Out for Me. Willie died of a stroke on January 10, 2001 at

the age of 65 in Tyler, Texas. Their music can be heard on radio stations and found in music stores and on-line as they remain popular artists of the 21th century. Johnson was among the first to combine Quartet Groups and Gospel Choirs for a new sound aka "choirtet" that proved to be a hit as with The Mississippi Mass Choir. That concept is still going strong today. "Lord, Take Us Through", with special guest Evangelist Dorothy Norwood, hit Billboard's Top 25. Willie Neal Johnson performed to sold out crowds in every section of the U.S.A.

Willie Neal Johnson is a household name all over the United States. Upon his death it was reported in newspapers all over America.

Mr. Johnson never moved his residence from Tyler, TX and was proud to proclaim that he was from the beautiful city of roses. When you mention Willie Neal Johnson people automatically identify him with Tyler. At his concerts he would be introduced as Willie Neal Johnson and the Gospel Keynotes of Tyler, TX. When Malaco Records asked him to do a live recording his request was to be able to do it in his hometown. Mr. Johnson was a professional and he paved the way for many other artists. I had the opportunity to attend several of his concerts. He was responsible for bringing some of the largest gospel concerts with many of the top gospel artists to Tyler. Mr. Johnson is a legend in gospel music and continues to inspire many. Just as Mr. Johnson was proud of his hometown we in return should be proud of the great accomplishments he made in the gospel music industry.
