### **INVOCATION**

### **MINUTES**

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Warren to approve the May 17 and May 24, 2017 minutes; seconded by Councilmember Nix; motion carried 7 - 0 & approved as presented.

## **AWARDS - RECOGNITIONS & SERVICE**

A-1 Request that the City Council consider recognizing the 2017 Volunteer of the Year.

David Lee, Jr. currently serves in the Tyler Public Library where he volunteers three days a week for the Resources Services division. He plays a vital role in assisting with donations, online sales and the annual book sale. David is even flexible with his efforts to help with shelving duties when not working with donations. David has volunteered a total of 333.25 hours in the last 12 months. Mr. Lee was unanimously recommended to be the City of Tyler's 2017 Volunteer of the Year.

A-2 Request that the City Council consider recognizing a City employee as the Blueprint Blue Ribbon Award winner for the month of July, for placing the highest premium on responsiveness to citizens' needs.

Mayor Heines presented Amber Rojas with the Blueprint Blue Ribbon Award for placing the highest premium on responsiveness to citizens' needs.

### **PRESENTATION**

P-1 Request that the City Council consider hearing a presentation on the major city-related bills from the recently concluded 85th Legislative Session, as presented by Brandon Aghamalian, President of Focused Advocacy.

This item was pulled from the agenda with no discussion and no action.

## **ORDINANCE**

O-1 Request that the City Council consider adopting an Ordinance amending Tyler City Code Chapter 4 to adopt current guidelines and criteria for Unlawful Noise in the City of Tyler. (O-2017-49)

<u>Police Chief Toler</u> – Stated that Sec. 4-90 of the City of Tyler Code of Ordinances makes it unlawful to make, continue, or cause to be made any loud or raucous noise, which is offensive to persons in the vicinity thereof and substantially impairs the peaceful enjoyment of public or private property. The proposed amendment will specify the maximum permitted sound levels in all arears and zoning districts within the City of Tyler.

In addition, the proposed amendment will establish guidelines for events to apply for and receive a special use permit and authorization from the designated City official.

Gaylord Hughey Jr. – Stated that he was here on behalf of the Grove Restaurant on Old Jacksonville Rd. He stated that they are in support of a noise ordinance but what they are concerned with is compliance and enforcement. Mr. Hughey stated that the Grove is an ongoing business, and their main concern is how can they comply with the noise ordinance.

The restaurant has done a lot to try to comply, however, given the way that the ordinance is written there is no specified location from which a decibel reading must be taken. Mr. Hughey stated that the City Council may want to create a music venue separation where you can have certainty regarding decibel levels and methods of measurement.

Mayor Heines stated that it would be a good idea for the Police Department to provide local music venues with information and training on the decibel limitations and measurement criteria contained in the ordinance.

Motion by Councilmember Moore to amend to review ordinance within a year or earlier if necessary; seconded by Councilmember Westbrook; motion carried 7 - 0 & approved as presented.



O-2 Request that the City Council consider adoption of an ordinance approving appointments to the Boards of Directors of the Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone No. 3 and Tyler Redevelopment Authority. (O-2017-50)

O-3 Request that the City Council consider the adoption of an ordinance amending Ordinance No. O-2016-90 concerning Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone Number 4 by amending the composition of the Board of Directors. (O-2017-51)

Heather Nick Managing Director of Planning & Development, – Stated that on September 28, 2016, and the Tyler City Council reestablished Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone Number 4 (TIRZ No. 4) for the downtown area. Included in the project and financing plans for TIRZ No. 4 is an analysis of historic ad valorem and sales tax revenues, which indicates there is a reasonable certainty the zone will generate resources necessary to accomplish the proposed projects, assuming participation by the City for the full 30 year duration of the zone, and participation by Smith County and Tyler Junior College for at least the first ten years.

Ordinance No. O-2016-90 originally set forth a Board of Directors for the Zone composed of nine members, including seven positions appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by City Council, and two positions appointed by other participating taxing jurisdictions. The proposed amendment will reduce the number of board members appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council to four (4) members, and provide three (3) board positions to be appointed by the Smith County Judge for the duration of Smith County's participation, and two (2) board positions to be appointed by the TJC Board of Trustees for the duration of Tyler Junior College's participation.

M-1 Request that the City Council consider authorizing the City Manager to sign a contract with Andrews Diversified Industries of Tyler, Texas, in the amount of \$58,940.00 for the Litter Control Program.

M-2 Request that the City Council authorize the City Manager to execute an Interlocal Cooperation Contract between City of Tyler Parks and Recreation Department and the University of Texas at Tyler.

<u>Stephanie Franklin, Managing Director</u> – Stated that the proposed project will provide a certified arborist to oversee the urban forest management programming for the use of the receiving party to retain the beauty of the campus in a sustainable manner.

William O'Donnell, University of Texas at Tyler – Spoke in support of the Interlocal Agreement.

Motion by Councilmember Westbrook; seconded by Councilmember Sellers; motion carried 7 - 0 & approved as presented.

M-3 Request that the City Council receive a presentation from Halff Associates of Richardson, Texas, on the Rose Complex Master Plan and consider adoption of the Master Plan for the Rose Complex.

<u>Presenter: Rick Leisner, Halff Associates</u> – Gave a brief presentation concerning the Master Plan for the Rose Complex. The Rose Complex, if developed according to the Master Plan, will help grow economic development, increase tourism, and improve the quality of life

for citizens. The vision of this plan will also increase mobility, parking and safety, entertainment, athletic facilities, neighborhood connectivity, as well as beautify the area with green space and landscaping. Funding for implementation could be initiated from a variety of public/private partnerships, including the Texas Department of Transportation, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Tyler ISD, grants as well as additional programmed Hotel/Motel taxes.

**<u>Bobby Land Sr.</u>**, - Requested that a meeting be set so that the citizens in that area could give input.

<u>Donald Sanders, 1020 S Buckley Ave.</u> – Stated that he was here in support of the Butler College community. The concern that they have is how this would affect Lyons Street and how it would affect south of Front Street. They would not like to see Lyons Street altered or closed in any form. They would like to see improvements on that street rather than re-routing it. Mr. Sanders stated that they were also concerned about how the master plan would affect the property and houses east of the Rose Garden.

Motion by Councilmember Bowdre; seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Warren; approved with amendment to include Lyons Street in the adoption of the Master Plan and to direct staff to send the East Texas Fair entity notice of the City's intent not to renew their lease of the related premises; motion carried 7 - 0 & approved as amended.

M-4 Request the City Council consider adopting a Resolution authorizing the Tyler City Manager on behalf of the Police Department to apply and accept if awarded the COPS Hiring Grant, which will fund salary and benefits for four new officer positions for three years. (R-2017-22)

Motion by Councilmember Nix; seconded by Councilmember Sellers; motion carried 7 - 0 & approved as presented.

M-5 Request that the City Council consider authorizing the City Manager to award a construction contract in the amount of \$176,436.20 to Reynolds & Kay, Ltd. for the Lake Tyler Concession Road Repair project.
