CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

- 1. Sales Tax figures available from the Texas Comptrollers' website indicate our Sales Tax revenues that were deposited Friday, October 8, 2021, are \$4,290,319.71. This compares to revenues of \$3,670,364.45 for the same period last year. The actual increase for the month compared to same month last year was 16.89%.
 - 2. Legacy Trail: City staff plans to meet in November with TxDOT to finalize the Advanced Funding Agreement. Once that agreement is finalized and executed the City will move forward with an engineering contract to complete design for the trail.

- The anticipated bid date is no later than August 2023 so construction on the trail extension should start later part of 2023.
- 3. Parks and Recreation: The repairs to the Glass Recreation Center's gym floor started on September 14. Repairs will include new wood flooring, followed by sanding, sealing and repainting existing court lines for basketball, volleyball and pickleball. We are currently in the phase of laying the new flooring. Once that is complete, the next phase will be sanding.
- 4. Annual Crime Report: The Texas Department of Public Safety released its annual report on 09-29-2021. The state of Texas reported an increase in Part 1 Violent Crime and a decrease in Part 1 Property Crimes. The report indicates that the City of Tyler had a 4.5% increase in Part 1 (Index) crimes from 2019 to 2020. Similar to the State of Texas (overall), the City of Tyler experienced an increase in Violent Crime. The primary driver of this increase was due to the number of reported Aggravated Assaults (+74). Part 1 (Index) crimes were up 3.81% and Part 2 Crimes were down -7.11%. The City of Tyler had an overall reduction in crime by 2.33% (-196 documented crimes).

<u>Deborah Pullum, City Attorney</u> – Gave dates for future public participation in the Redistricting process:

- Set public hearings on draft districting plan options on the agendas for the October 27, 2021 and November 10, 2021 City Council meeting.
- Set public comment sessions for November 3rd at the Glass Recreation Center and November 4th at the Tyler Police South Sub-station, and
- Set date of adoption of a final districting plan on the agenda for the December 8, 2021 City Council meeting.

Statement of NAACP Tyler, Texas Branch #6232

City Council Meeting – 10/13/2021

I thank you so much for the opportunity to speak for my three minutes. As we all know I think all of us are new with this redistricting aspect and I definitely so, so forgive me if I am elementary in any of my statements. One of the things that I am, also, I'm representing NAACP Tyler Texas Branch #6232. Some of the things we wanted to ensure when it comes to the criteria that's developed is Identifiable geographic boundaries should be followed.

We want to ensure that communities of interest be maintained and that we would avoid splitting neighborhoods. Looking at the composition of whole voting precincts when possible and practical that the configurations are relatively equal in total population, compacted and composed of contiguous territory as seen on the maps that were presented. We definitely need to preserve incumbent-constituency relations by recognition of the residence of incumbents. Not crack or pack minority voters as stated in the presentation. Composed of whole census block groups or blocks. As well, within acceptable Total Maximum Deviation.

We need you to narrowly tailor the plan to comply with the Voting Rights Act. Mr. Mayor, I'm glad that you utilized the word transparency, because that's one of the things we really want to ensure. I was a little disappointed when I heard that it wasn't approved for a community advisory group just to be in assistance with this entire process because again, we're all new and going through this. But transparency in the aspect of availability of redistricting plans and availability of redistricting software, availability of redistricting data, clearly documented redistricting criteria and providing the community with the tools that's needed to create their own plans.

Also, identify if there are any coalition districts within our six districts. So, we don't want the minorities fighting over a district as seen in various races that are ran. Mine specifically two years ago it was minority versus minority. There is a need to develop two additional districts in order for Hispanic representation in government. However, we don't want the African American district divided in order to do so. We want to preserve our African American district, specifically District 3. Based on the presentation we understand that race cannot be a primary factor in redistricting, but it constitutes similar lifestyles, neighborhoods, and the commonality of individuals.

FYI, I wanted to know for my own interest, is this company that's drawing the maps representing only the city's aspect of the map drawing or does it also include the county. Because I know county districts are different than city council districts are different than JP precincts, are different than school board districts, so I need that question answered. Proposed redistricting timelines, can they be represented, can we get help with the drawing at the workshop.
